Studio	Becky	So, following the VTR, I'd like to talk about "understanding Japan". I often hear that when people return back to Japan after staying in the US for a long time, they experience a reverse culture shock.
	Masayo G	Yes, I think in Japan it is called "gyaku-karu". You can no longer fit back into the original environment and customs you lived with.
	Becky	So, did you have many troubles in Japan?
